# PROFESSOR RICHARD JOHNSON AO, MBE

Architect



The Sydney Opera House – Legacy and Lessons

# **Director, Johnson Pilton Walker Pty Ltd**

Richard Johnson graduated with First Class Honours in architecture from UNSW in 1969 and a Master of Philosophy in Town Planning from University College, London. He was

awarded the RAIA Gold Medal in 2008, a Life Fellow in 2012, a Life Governor of the AGNSW in 2012, and a Distinguished Alumni Award from UNSW in 2013.

In 1976 he was admitted as a Member of the Order of the British Empire for Public Service in the field of architecture. Richard was appointed as architectural advisor to the Sydney Opera House Trust in 1998. He was awarded the RAIA Gold Medal in 2006, a Life Fellow in 2008, a Life Governor of the AGNSW in 2012, and a distinguished Alumni Award from UNSW in 2013. In 2014 Richard was appointed an AO for distinguished services to architecture, particularly the design of iconic Australian public buildings, to the visual arts and the museum and galleries sector, and to professional associations.

His work includes the National Portrait Gallery in Canberra, the Anzac Memorial in Sydney, the Asian Galleries at the Art Gallery of NSW, the Eastern Courtyard at the Australian War Memorial and the Chau Chak Wing Museum at the University of Sydney.

Dr Michael Spence has been the Vice-Chancellor and Principal of the University of Sydney since 2008. An alumnus of the University of Sydney, Dr Spence graduated with first-class honours in English, Italian and law.

In 2017, Dr Spence was awarded a Companion of the Order of Australia for eminent service to leadership of the tertiary education sector, to the advancement of equitable access to educational opportunities, to developing strategic programs focused on multidisciplinary research, and to the Anglican Church of Australia.

In December he will step down to become head of the prestigious University College London.



# **STORYTELLER**

#### **David Greatorex**

David told us an interesting tale about the Centennial Park area.



Water supply in early Sydney was initially by bucket from the Lachlan Swamp area, now Centennial Park, to Hyde Park. In 1837 Busby's Bore was completed. It transported water from Busby's Pond near the South East corner of Lang Street to Hyde Park. It was built by convicts over 10 years and is 3.6km long.

As public parks were quite a new thing in the Victorian era, to commemorate the centennial year of the NSW colony, Centennial Park was created in 1880 the opening of which was attended by huge 30,000 crowd.

Moving on to 1980 David outlined the establishment of the Centennial Park Authority following the sacking of the City of Sydney Council by the NSW Government. Subsequently he and a number of Commissioners were appointed who blocked the planned sale to a developer of Moore Park Golf Course, the ES Marks Athletic Field and adjacent land. The government gave the land to the Centennial Park Trust to ensure the land is preserved in perpetuity for the public of NSW.

#### **GUEST SPEAKER**

#### Mike Munro AM

The Last of the Bushrangers and This is Your Life



Mike's presentation was in two parts. Firstly, he told his own family history including his two Great Uncles who were Australia's last bushrangers, and then some of his experiences presenting *This is Your Life*.

Mike had a difficult upbringing with his mother who was a lovely caring well-read Dr Jekyll when sober, but a horrendous abusive alcoholic Mr Hyde for much of his younger life,

together living in a seminary, after being estranged from his father since an infant. He described his father as an Irish rogue with whom he didn't have a good relationship, although there was some recontact as Mike became an adult

Mike was 30 years old and an established TV journalist when his dying father told him of the incredible story of the Kenniff brothers, the cousins of his grandfather, who had changed his name from Kenniff to Munro out of shame. From initial disbelief, Mike's subsequent investigations revealed the full gruesome story culminating in the brothers killing a policeman and a station manager on Easter Sunday 1902, burning their bodies and putting the remains in police saddle bags.

The story was exciting, and Mike's delivery brought it to life. He outlined the many controversies of the Trial and the Appeal, the pastoralists versus the squatters, the Catholics versus the Protestants, the allowing of testimony from an aboriginal, the Trial judge sitting on the Appeal panel etc.

Then in response to a member's question, Mike regaled us with a range of memorable experiences from his time as presenter of *This Is Your Life*. Having undertaken hard hitting investigative journalism in newspapers and TV, including on *Willesee*, 60 *Minutes* then hosting *A Current Affair* and *Sunday Night*, Mike was somewhat hesitant to take on the family show. He decided that unsung heroes would make excellent candidates. He then described many hair-raising experiences, some as consequences of secret phone calls required to create a personal profile, misunderstandings and hilarious incidents, many with celebrities.

He was firm however that the surprise introductions looked and were absolutely genuine, and a number of high-profile shows were cancelled when details were leaked in advance.

Ray Hyslop's vote of thanks accurately reflected members' enjoyment of a thoroughly stimulating highly entertaining professional presentation.

Many members purchased Mike's book, a review of which will be included in the November Newsletter. # A SIMPLE EXERCISE PROGRAM FOR YOU!

Each day you'll find that you can hold this position for just a bit longer.



# **BOOK REVIEWS**

## **DAMASCUS**

## Christos Tsiolkas



Here is yet another book that comes with the same warning – not for the fainthearted. This author loves blood and guts so the early years of the Christian era (AD 35-87) provide fertile ground. It is not a fairy story or particularly cerebral. Those early years were turbulent, violent and bloody; and the author revels in it.

Nor does it purport to be a history of St Paul and his life. It is a novel, but with a point to prove there is room in the Christian Church for those who do not believe in the resurrection and those who are practicing homosexuals — like the author.

However, as an excellent novelist, these points are made through the thoughts, actions and interactions between the real and fictional characters of Paul, Timothy, Thomas, Lydia and others.

"Who was Paul? And is it possible to reconcile what is revelatory and crucial in Christian ethics with the fraught history of Christianity itself? That questioning is what led me to writing this book." (Authors note)

Its strengths lie in its detailed and bloody descriptions of everyday life in the Middle East under Roman rule. The life and times of Jews, Romans, Greeks, slaves, women, the literate and illiterate are all described in detail. The author has a gift for powerful language. Only the very rich and privileged seem to have lived the type of life we would find acceptable today.

Its weaknesses lie in the very idiosyncratic view the author takes of real and imagined characters. It is unlikely that there are any insights for those interested in the true history of biblical characters like St Paul and St Thomas. On the other hand, it does give an insight into what it might have been like to have lived in those turbulent, violent and bloody times. On that basis the book has been well reviewed and is worth reading.

Researchers from the University of Sydney are conducting an innovative study using text messages to support recovery of people suffering from low back pain. The study is a remotely conducted clinical trial named 'TEXT4myBACK'. The study is being led by Prof. Manuela Ferreira, who is ranked as the 3<sup>rd</sup> researcher in the world in the field of low back pain. The study was approved by the Northern Sydney Local Health District Ethics Committee (ETH 13895).

# **RECIPE OF THE MONTH!**

# Ricciarelli

MAKES 24-30 DELICIOUS BISCUITS
Gluten free

#### **Ingredients**

3 cups almond meal
1 cup caster sugar
2 egg whites
finely grated zest of 1 lemon
1 dessertspoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon almond essence
icing sugar for dusting



#### Method

Preheat the oven to 180°C. Line a baking tray with baking paper.

Mix the almond meal and sugar in a large bowl. Add the egg whites, lemon juice and lemon zest and mix through to create a paste using your hands.

Roll the dough into a log and cut into small rounds of dough. Shape the dough with your hands into an oval about 1cm thick.

Dust in the icing sugar to coat well then place onto the lined tray leaving room for spreading.

Bake for 10 minutes or until the cookies look slightly marked and the bottom is firm. Cool on a rack.
