The trip starts at 10am at the wharf at Dangar Road Brooklyn and lasts for approximately 3 hours.

The first Riverboat Postman started the run in 1910, and the tradition continues today. The Riverboat visits Dangar, Milson Islands, Kangaroo Point, Bar Point, Marlow Creek, Fisherman's Point, and Milson's Passage before returning to Brooklyn at 1.15pm.

The ferry office is only about 50 metres from the lift at 'Brooklyn Station', whose correct name is Hawkesbury River

Coffee, tea and biscuits are served for morning tea and a ploughman's lunch, all are included in the cost.

Defence of Sydney Tour





The Probus activity in June will explore the defences at North Head.

This is an opportunity to walk in the footsteps of men and women who served at North Fort. We will be accompanied by a knowledgeable guide and inspect heritage gun emplacements and descend into the 200metre long military tunnel complex. Finally, we will enter the once secret Plotting Room which controlled naval shipping in the region during the Second World War.

As the numbers per tour is limited, we have been able to organise two tours. The first tour on Monday 21 June and the second on Monday 28 June. Each tour will take 16 persons so a total of 32 members and guests can attend. Both commence at 10.30am

This tour involves a steep incline and some uneven surfaces, and it is not suitable for wheelchairs. A moderate level of fitness and mobility is required.

Duration of the tour is 90 minutes, metered Parking is available nearby

LEVEL ACCESS TO THE UNION, UNIVERSITY AND SCHOOLS CLUB

The UUSC provides an alternative entry to the club that is completely level for members and guests who find it difficult using the stairs leading into the main entrance. The alternative entry is ideal for members using walking aids or even wheelchairs.

The entry is from Bligh Street. It is the very first driveway on the left adjacent to 2 Bligh Street, approximately 60 meters from the corner if Bent and Bligh Street. It is possible to drive into the basement level of the club and dropped off and picked up. Once in the carpark it is a short and level distance to the entry and the lifts to all floors of the club.

Darcy Wentworth



GUEST SPEAKER CHRIS MASTERS



Chris reflected on his distinguished career in the media that has spanned 45 years.

He was thankful for the broad training and foundation values of decency and honesty, that were learnt in his first posting for the ABC at Albury and other regional centres. He also drew on the guidance of his mother, who was also a country reporter, who believed that one should report

the facts, then let the readership make up their minds about what matters. This, and the importance of independent press, contrasts too often with common modern media focus on unchecked statements/opinion, "narrowcasting" rather than broadcasting.

His child's ill-health necessitated a move to Sydney. He joined Four Corners where he became the longest serving reporter spanning 26 years. Among the numerous farreaching investigations covered there, his talk focused on corruption, and especially on the "Moonlight State" report which led to the Fitzgerald Inquiry into corruption within the Qld Police and Government. He referred to the modern scientific investigations and policing methods now in place, contrasting with the influence of some key corrupt officers and politicians over 20 years ago.

He drew on his many visits to battlefields in Vietnam, Timor, Rwanda and Afghanistan. He expressed pride in Australia's war history, with recent generations of our forces doing fine jobs in difficult and dangerous circumstances. In peace keeping roles they are like diplomats and social workers, showing courageous restraint to endeavour to win the hearts and minds of the local communities. Unfortunately, serious misconduct has allegedly occurred, called out by decent honest soldiers. Though these alleged war crimes are very uncomfortable, he commended the Australian Government and ADF leadership for being prepared to do the decent thing to uphold the principles on which our military history is based and on which we can be so proud. John was educated at Sydney Grammar. He became a chartered accountant working with David Fell & Co and then Troup Harwood before starting in investment management with International Pacific which later became Rothschild Australia. He established the fund management business of Perpetual Trustees where he worked for nearly 20 years and subsequently managed funds for the Vincent Fairfax family. He was a member of Royal Sydney Golf Club for 65 years, his mother was a member for 75 years and his wife, who was a member for 48 years, became Lady Captain. He was a cricket tragic. In our Club he was a member for 5 years, three of which he served as Treasurer. He was a very regular attender at meetings and functions and his friendly cheerful manner will be sorely missed.

Detailed planning for our 2017 two-month trip around northern Italy was well advanced when I read a fascinating article about a high-quality clothing manufacture in *The Economist* magazine '1843': "The philosopher king Brunello Cucinelli takes as much care over his workers as his clothes. Luke Leitch visits a model factory in the

heart of Umbria." So, I said, "why don't we visit Solomeo? it's near Perugia".

It was quite simple to incorporate tiny Solomeo into our itinerary and we booked AirBnb farm-type accommodation on the outskirts of the village for a week. But arriving there wasn't so simple as our GPS destination terminated in bramble bushes on the edge of an olive grove. After a phone call to our host, we were met outside the church and easily arrived at our destination.

The following day we returned to the church, wandered around the town square and narrow streets, and visited Cucinelli's showroom. We were full of admiration for the beautifully designed and tailored luxurious cashmere - unfortunately well beyond our price range. Every detail of the showroom is impeccably designed and executed. The attention to quality and detail continues throughout the village including a wonderful concert hall and library donated by Cucinelli. Around 3,000 people in the surrounding

area work for the company, which has established specialised training schools there. The company has 106 "retail stores around the world located in the most exclusive shopping streets." My memory of Cucinelli's background is that his earlier interest in studying engineering dissipated, and he turned to an interest in philosophy while contemplating in bars.

BOOK REVIEW

A Room Made of Leaves by Kate Grenville (2020): 317 pages



Supporters of Governor Bligh, other opponents of John Macarthur and feminists will love this book. Others may not be so happy. But worth reading for the beauty of the writing, although do not expect to meet Bligh, or any other governor (except Phillip) within its pages.

The book is told through the eyes of Elizabeth Macarthur as the long-suffering wife of John. However, in my view historical accuracy is not allowed to stand in the way of a good tale; the story of Elizabeth from birth in 1766 until her death in 1850. We

are transported in detail from her early life in Devon, through marriage to John, long voyage to Australia and the early years of the first settlement. Only the last section of the book deals with Parramatta and sheep – so don't be disappointed.


The problem with historical fiction is that the author is dealing with real people, about whom much has been written and who themselves have left records. Without recourse to the history books and factual sources, it is difficult to gauge the accuracy of her treatment of John Macarthur, William Dawes and Capt Tench. Only Dawes comes out well. In this book, the only good things about John Macarthur are his enforced absences overseas. On the other hand, Elizabeth is painted like a Jane Austen heroine (think Elizabeth Bennett) but even smarter and more 21st-century.

However, the descriptions of the early settlement, scenery and aborigines are vivid and memorable – as you would expect from the author of The Secret River and other books. She has obviously done considerable research – but was John Macarthur as bad as he is painted? If nothing else the book will make some of us reach for the history book – while enjoying the writing and colour.

To what extent is it fair to require historical fiction to be accurate or reasonably accurate?
